Liquefied Petroleum Gas Cylinder Exchange Storage

The summer barbecuing season is about to swing into full speed mode, and that means there is an increased likelihood of accidents with flammable liquids and liquefied petroleum gases. A fairly recent marketing shift in LPG allows homeowners to bring their empty LPG cylinders to an exchange point and trade them out for full ones.
