

# FY2011 SHSP and SLETPP Grants: Reference Guide

## Overview

Frequently Asked Question from Grantees to DHSES:

*"Why is filling out homeland security grant applications so difficult and time consuming? For each project, I have to indicate how it links to an Investment Justification (that changes from year to year), a Target Capability (37 to choose from), a Grants and Training (G&T) Code (whatever that is) and, of course, a Goal in the State Homeland Security Strategy – I'm wearing 5 different hats within my County already and I don't have time to spend making all of these linkages to different State/Federal documents!"*

Answer: DHSES understands that applying for homeland security grants can be a cumbersome process because of the extensive linkages that must be made between your project(s) and different State/Federal documents. DHSES has developed this "Reference Guide" to support and streamline your application process for FY2011 SHSP and SLETPP grants. This Reference Guide highlights specific project areas that support the State Homeland Security Strategy and our FY2011 Investment Justifications and that are clearly linked back to other federal preparedness documents (e.g. Target Capability List). The use of this Reference Guide should help you in completing your application for homeland security grant funds.

## Directions

1. Identify a project your jurisdiction would like to address with homeland security funds.
2. Identify which Strategy Goal most closely aligns with your proposed project - The Reference Guide is organized by Strategy Goal, beginning with Goal 1 (CBRNE Detection, Response, and Decontamination) and ending with Goal 10 (Cyber Security). 3. Review the Project Areas associated with this Goal and make the connection between your proposed project and the defined Project Areas associated with each Investment.
4. When entering your Project details in E-Grants, use the Reference Guide to fill in the appropriate linkages that are required. The G&T Code, Investment Justification, Target Capability Link, and Strategy Objective Links are addressed in the "Workplan" Tab in E-Grants, while the National Priority and Strategy Goal Links are addressed in the "Funding Allocation" Tab in E-Grants.
5. Repeat this process as necessary until your plan for your FY2011 SHSP and/or SLETPP grants is complete.

**Example: Empire County would like to use their SHSP funds to purchase Information Technology (IT) equipment to enhance their Emergency Operations Center (EOC). After reviewing the Goals in the State Strategy, Goal 5 (Enhance Incident Management and Response Capabilities) appears to be the closest fit. Empire County scrolls down to the Goal 5 area in the Reference Guide and finds EOCs as a defined "Project Area" under this Goal. After making this connection, Empire County is able to ascertain what linkages should be made when entering this project into E-Grants: G&T Code (#4), Investment Justification (Emergency Management), Target Capability (EOC Management), National Priority (Implement NIMS/NRF), and Strategy Objective (5.17).**

### **Definitions of Key Documents Addressed in Reference Guide**

**1. State Homeland Security Strategy: This Strategy provides a comprehensive framework to guide, organize and unify homeland security efforts in New York State. The Strategy contains 10 Goals and over 100 related objectives. The complete Strategy can be accessed online at: [http://www.security.state.ny.us/publications/2009\\_NYS\\_Homeland\\_Security\\_Strategy.pdf](http://www.security.state.ny.us/publications/2009_NYS_Homeland_Security_Strategy.pdf).**

**2. Grants and Training (G&T) Codes: The federal Department of Homeland Security (DHS) utilizes standardized G&T codes across the country to better understand how federal homeland security dollars are supporting specific priorities. A complete list of G&T codes can be accessed in the SHSP/SLETPP Program Guidance released by DHSES.**

**3. Investment Justifications: Each year, New York State is required to develop detailed project plans, called Investment Justifications, in order to apply for federal homeland security funding. Each IJ contains one or more related projects underneath it and these "Project Areas" are outlined in detail in this Reference Guide. All of your SHSP and SLETPP awards must be spent in support of one or more of our IJs and a complete list of IJs can be found in the SHSP/SLETPP Program Guidance.**

**4. Target Capability List (TCL): The TCL contains 37 different capabilities (e.g. Communications, Responder Safety and Health, etc.) that are used to accomplish homeland security missions. Each capability contains elements of planning, organization, equipment, training, and exercises. The complete TCL can be accessed online at: <http://www.fema.gov/pdf/government/training/tcl.pdf>.**

**5. National Priorities: The National Priorities were defined by the federal Department of Homeland Security (DHS) to accompany the TCL. There are 8 National Priorities and a complete list can be accessed in the SHSP/SLETPP Program Guidance.**

**\*Note: The SHSP and SLETPP columns included in the chart below provide an approximate breakdown of which projects are allowable under the SHSP and/or SLETPP grants. As a reminder, all SLETPP grant funds must be used in support of law enforcement prevention-oriented planning, organization, training, exercise, and equipment acquisition activities.**
