Description:

The *Community Mass Care and Emergency Assistance* course is designed to provide training for local communities to prepare for and manage this function effectively. The goal is to prepare community agencies, organizations, and businesses to work together to provide Mass Care and Emergency Assistance services to those affected by disaster.

The purpose of this course is to develop foundational knowledge of Mass Care and Emergency Assistance services in the community. It is not a “how to” for sheltering. Participants will use this information to build community emergency Action Items and to identify gaps in the community’s program.

Mass Care and Emergency Assistance (MC/EA) is primarily focus on sheltering, feeding and distribution of emergency, MC/EA has evolved beyond those traditional functions and now includes:

- Access and functional needs support,
- Reunification services,
- Evacuation support and
- Support to household pets and service animals.

Course Objectives:

1. Define the four primary MC/EA services as discussed in this course.
2. Describe how to determine their community’s MC/EA service resource requirements.
3. Identify providers that exist in their community or can be called upon from a nearby community to meet the requirements for MC/EA
4. Name planning and operational actions that can affect how services will be provided.
5. List Action Items to utilize resources and providers to meet MC/EA requirements in their community.
